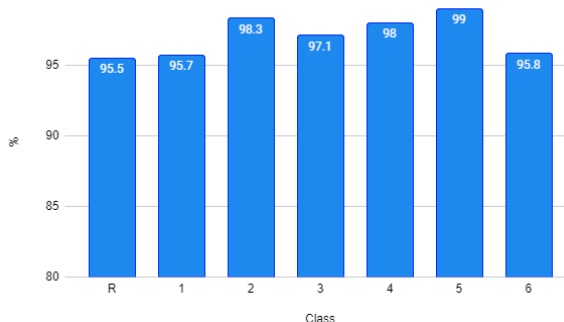

Climate Conference

On the fourteenth of March, four of our amazing Year 5 students (Anna, Haniesha, Isabelle and Lucas) went to Stockport Council Town Hall to take part a debate about climate action. Haniesha and Anna had been chosen to 'chair' the event, which meant they were responsible for organising the speeches and ensuring all the pupils spoke at the correct time.

During their time there, Lucas and Isabelle, had the opportunity to present their views on five ideas that the council will put into action. The ideas were: community gardens; the Stockport CAN project; more accessible modes of electric transport, improving the protection of wildlife through the development of shelters; and the funding and use of solar panels. The debate was passionate, competitive and full of superb ideas and counter arguments. At the end of the debate, all the pupils from the schools attending were able to vote on the idea that they thought would be most beneficial in the fight against climate change in Stockport. The idea that gained the most votes was the Community Gardens. The result was announced to the whole chamber (including the Head of Stockport Council, Mark Hunter and the Deputy Mayor of Stockport) by Anna and Haniesha. When asked about the event , Anna said, "Sitting in the chamber made us feel so important and it was a great experience' 'Isabelle, who was in the thick of the debate added, "it was a brilliant experience and I had the time of my life".



Stop, Look , Listen

Year 2 loved their Road Safety this week despite the awful weather! All the children were able to get out for an hour session where they learnt how to safely cross a road straight ahead, behind a car and at a T junction.
